
The DHC-4 Caribou - A Canadian Workhorse

The DHC-4 Caribou was a breakthrough product for the post-war de Havilland Canada Company. It was a rugged and versatile aircraft with a revolutionary STOL capacity. As such it captured a worldwide market and paved the way for other outstanding designs from Canada. The history and the attributes of this aviation classic will be examined with specific emphasis on the



RCAF operation of the Caribou in the Kashmir for the United Nations in the 1960s.

Gary Brown received his pilot wings with the RCAF in 1962. Thereafter he instructed on Chipmunk and Tutor aircraft, and operated Caribous and Cosmopolitans. Post-RCAF Gary flew Viscounts, Jet Stars and Challengers for Transport Canada and then jumbo jets for both Wardair and Emirates Airlines. He retired in 2000 as the Director of Flight Training for Emirates Airlines.
