The Hubble History

The Hubble telescope has been in orbit for 29 years and during its lifetime has delivered iconic images of distant stars and galaxies. The Hubble telescope has the reach to see further into our universe than any other optical device, and has advanced the frontiers of scientific knowledge. Chris will present a history of this remarkable device and explain how it overcame many obstacles

in its remarkable career.

Chris is a historian specializing in the technical aspects of aviation and space technology. He is the President of the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada and the editor of *Quest; The History of Spaceflight Quarterly*. Chris is the author of five books on these subjects, and is currently working on an official history of the Hubble Telescope under contract from NASA.
